


\*Please note, this year, after 20 years, we are giving Fr. Harry a break from *annual* home blessings (annual home blessings are not one of his duties as a priest, even though it's a Slavic custom to supplement the priest's income) but he will still bless new homes (which is his duty as a priest). That being said, you CAN bless your own homes. This is a traditional Orthodox custom, that when you get the blessed waters you take it to your homes and bless it because you are priests of the Royal Priesthood. This was the original purpose of Theophany blessing of waters, that the priest blessed the waters, and you took it home as priests of your own home and blessed them. Fr. Harry likely will not say "no" to anyone on the annual home blessings, but he just asks that you don't for this year. Biblically we are supposed to give not just your priest but even animals who work for you a break every 7 years. Let him know you love and respect him by not asking for the annual home blessings just for this year. God gives even beasts of burden a break every 7 years and we are backowed for this on as a parish, even if we are relatively new.

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\*Note, tentatively and subject to amendment, Fr. Harry's On Duty Schedule from Sunday January 7 until March 24 will be generally as follows, and it is expected for you to schedule and not just "drop in" and also not to make the priest "wait" for the scheduled appointment:

Sundays from 6am until 3pm Mondays from 8am until 10pm Tuesdays from 8am until 1pm Wednesdays from 8am until 10pm

Fr. Harry and Pani Carrie will be available ONLY for emergencies on Thursday-Saturday from January 7 until March 10

Father Harry will be "on call" for all hours from March 11 through March 23, but will be with his family intermittently (actually all of the time, but with phone off intermittently) and get back to you asap.

From March 24 until April 28 Fr. Harry will be generally on duty: Wednesdays 8am-10pm Fridays 8am-10pm Sundays 8am-10pm

Other days/hours as need per genuine emergency.

From April 28 (Palm Sunday) until Pascha (May 5) Fr. Harry will be working every day morning until night (about 2 weeks of work in one week). Fr. Harry will take personal sessions before Holy Thursday, as we have had 50 days to focus on ourselves for the last 50 days but should focus on Christ alone now . Please note, there are, per church order, no confessions nor memorials from Palm Sunday until St. Thomas Sunday, as our focus in solely on participating in Christ's Passion and Resurrection during those days.

The general schedule above will be departed from on any scheduled time off. In other words, if the priest has to work 60 hours a week, he will be able to take off the other 20 hours in following weeks.

## On Stewardship and the Orthodox Life. By Father Frederick Watson.

"...the least of these..."

...for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me ... as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me. (Matthew 25:35,40)

Do you know anyone in need? That is to say, do you know anyone who has a real need for real resources: food, clothing, shelter, funds, medical care? Has anyone ever called upon you to provide such needs? Or do you shrug them off with an unfeeling, unsympathetic refusal? I used to live in

a big city, and often walked the streets of the downtown area. There I was regularly accosted by individuals seeking money or transportation. Most people I know shrug them off just as regularly, with an unfeeling, unsympathetic refusal.

The reasons often given by most people are based on a kind of profiling of street people. "Oh, all they want is money for drugs or alcohol." "If you give them anything, they will never let you alone." "They are going to steal everything you have."

I decided one day to start giving assistance to people who asked for a specific need, like they were hungry and wanted money for food. At first, I would just give a dollar to each one who asked. When that seemed not enough (who can get anything except a candy bar for a dollar anymore?), I decided to purchase gift certificates from a well-known fast food chain, and give them away to whoever was hungry. Then I would invite them to go with me to that fast food chain restaurant and eat together to learn something about each other. It was satisfying to be able to do something to meet a need. But it was also very apparent that one person handing out gift certificates would never, by itself, solve the world's hunger problems.

In our Orthodox view of life, every part of our life is connected in some way to our Orthodoxy. There is nothing that is not what has come to be called "spiritual" and other things outside that realm. Feeding a hungry body is also feeding a hungry soul. (Think about fasting for a moment.) That is why the Church is involved in the whole life of every person. Our stewardship includes the sharing of time, talent and treasure for the salvation of the whole world. Our stewardship, as well, includes what we can contribute to the feeding of bodies and souls (even one at a time).

Remember what Our Lord Himself said: ... as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me.
